Mammoth Mountain 2024 Ski Trip



On Feb. 9, 2024, 35 TCSC members arrived at Mammoth Mountain in California. The High Sierra Mountain Range provided epic skiing and snowboarding. We were greeted with bright bluebird skies every day and lots of snow. The scenery was breathtaking everywhere you looked.

On Saturday, our first ski day, we had a pre-breakfast yoga stretch (Thank you Patti for leading us every day!), a big burrito breakfast, and then the Mammoth Mountain guides greeted us and took us for a 3-hour mountain tour and gave us a short history of the area.

On Super Bowl Sunday, many of us made it to the summit. The views were incredible! Many skied back down, but some decided that downloading via the gondola was the better option. At McCoy Station you could find a stuffed "Woolly Mammoth" if you looked in the right room – it was pretty big! However, Mammoth wasn't named for a Woolly Mammoth. It was part of a marketing scheme in the 1800s to give the impression that an abundance of gold was found in that area, which wasn't true, but the name stuck. That evening, we had a Super Bowl party in our trip leaders' rooms. Good thing we were on the third floor as it got a little loud yelling for our favorite teams!



On Tuesday, Brenda arranged a side trip for anyone who wanted to go to June Mountain, Mammoth's sister mountain about 20 minutes away. June is more of a family mountain with easily skiable trails along with moguls for anyone who wants a challenge. We were able to pile 12 people into 2 taxis and it was so worth the trip! We had the entire mountain to ourselves – great conditions, sunny skies, no wind, and no lift lines! The most amazing part was you could still find corduroy on any trail at the end of the day.

On Wednesday, Mammoth's Eastside K-9 Avalanche Rescue Team put on a demonstration for our group. Besides learning about the dogs, their breeds, and their training, we witnessed a mock avalanche rescue. They buried a ski patrol volunteer under the snow! They showed exactly what happens after an avalanche, from finding the location, marking off the area, and the commands the dog needs to find someone, plus how to keep finding more people who may be buried under snow. The dogs are not rewarded with treats; they are rewarded by playing tug with their master. It was a great learning experience for all of us.



On Thursday we got almost a foot of new snow on the mountain, and everyone was able to get some turns in the fresh powder. That night we

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all went to the Rock N Bowl for a few bowling games and had a delicious group dinner upstairs in the Brassiere. It was so nice – you couldn't tell a bowling alley was beneath us!

After a scenic bus ride on Friday, our group arrived in Reno for an overnight at the Circus Circus Hotel. The slot machines were everywhere. Some of us won a few bucks and some lost a few. Where to have dinner was the most difficult decision of the day after getting lost between three interconnected hotels and casinos.

After several gate changes at the airport in Dallas, we arrived in Syracuse on Saturday happy and tired with lots of great memories along with some new friends! After our cancellation of this trip last year, it was well worth the wait to finally get to Mammoth.
